We will shortly meet in Zoom on 23 April 11.15 so that I can present the course idea and course assessment to you and so that you can ask questions. This will maybe take 60-90 min. There will be no meeting on 21 May. It is just a placeholder: you will have tasks which you can complete asynchronously (so anytime you like until 2 July). The meeting on 2 July will take place online, certainly in Gathertown. So you should have a good internet connection. (If you don't have good internet at home, you may also come to university to use a room in G40.) The meetings on 9 and 10 July will also take place online, certainly in Gathertown. Those days are the UN Simulation. If you would definitely like to meet up on campus for the simulation, we could also postpone the simulation into October (before 11 October when the new semester starts).

- Content:** *Content Description*
The United Nations Security Council (SC) will meet to discuss a peace and security topic and find new avenues to manage or even resolve the conflict. The students will take over the role of diplomats who represent a Member State of the SC and mutually develop and negotiate a resolution on which the body will vote. Before having to prepare their positions, the students will democratically choose the agenda topic of the SC meeting: they have the choice between “The Situation in Yemen” and “Impact of COVID-19 on Peace and Security”. Before the simulation begins, the students will learn about conflict management and conflict resolution in theory, analyze the previous Security Council conflict management efforts on the topic and develop new ideas based on theoretical assumptions. After the simulation, reflecting on the simulation experience and the current international conflict management process is an important part of this seminar; the students will find themselves in a role conflict between being peace researchers and having to represent the interests of their state realistically.

Learning aims

Eventually, students will be able to:

- analyze and critically evaluate international conflict management and resolution processes,
- apply basic negotiation and rhetorical techniques, and
- develop feasible management or resolution options to international conflicts.

Content: Practical Conflict Management requires certain (e.g. communicative) micro skills, a high level of self-reflexivity and role awareness, as well as the ability to structure and moderate complex processes. The seminar provides opportunities to further develop those personal skills and to get sensible for the typical challenges in dealing with conflicts.

Mediation as a form of Conflict Management is used in a variety of contexts ranging from interpersonal conflict to conflicts in international relations. In the UN Guidance for Effective Mediation it is defined as „a process whereby a third party assists two or more parties, with their consent, to prevent, manage or resolve a conflict by helping them to develop mutually acceptable agreements.“

Seminar participants will get the chance to deepen their understanding of the structure, principles and methods of mediation. The focus of the seminar will be on the practical application of mediative micro skills as these are central in all areas of mediation.

Note: The course is primarily meant for 2nd term students in obligatoty module 4 and worth 10 credit points.

Students from higher semesters can also parttake as a course in module 9.

Content: Often, postcoloniality is presented as something far away from Europe. In seminars on post-colonial theory we teach literature from people everywhere in the world and talk about how things should be different on a grand scale. However, postcoloniality as a condition concerns the whole world and is as relevant today and in Magdeburg as it is anywhere else. The seminar aims at identifying ways in which the postcolonial condition is present in Magdeburg through neo-colonial attitudes, racist custom and ignorance. It will try to pinpoint local issues that stand in a context of colonial history and propose plans of action to address those issues.

The course is planned as a research seminar. Over the first weeks we will have 4-hour sessions where we will work on both de- and postcolonial theory and methodology. The rest of the seminar will then have a workshop format: you will carry out small research projects in groups in the weeks with no sessions and give each other feedback and discuss preliminary results when we have sessions.

The final outcome will vary according to the amount of credit points you need.

Modul 4: for 10CP the outcomes have to be presented in the final session in a poster format. A group term paper then has to be written that details the research process and outcomes and sketches a project idea to address the conflict you researched.

The course leaves a lot of room for you to do your own project and follow up on what you are interested in. That means also, that you need to be willing to work autonomously and collaborate well with you group.

Module 5 Methods of Peace and Conflict Studies

Note: The seminar will give an overview of different methods in Peace & Conflict Studies and European Studies and will be taught by a range of different lecturers in the form of a “ring seminar”. It will be structured in three parts. The first part is concerned with more general questions surrounding the research process, including reflections on different epistemological perspectives on research methods, research questions and research practices. The second part of the seminar will turn to positivist methods including text analysis, comparative case studies design, surveys, interviews and content analysis. Part three will turn to post-positivist approaches and include session on discourse and visual analysis, ethnographic approaches and participatory action research. The seminar will be accompanied by a tutorial and a student conference at the end (14-15.07.2021) in which all participants will present and discuss their methodologies which are to be applied in the term paper. The conference will be organized like a normal academic conference with panels, discussants and chairs and will be open to all MA students of PACS, EUS and Sowi.

10 CP for participation, research project and research report

Content: The focus of this research seminar is on qualitative methods, particularly interviews. Students shall acquire methodological knowledge for taking interviews and analyzing them to write a research report. For that purpose, they will design their own research project and apply it out of classroom. To achieve that goal regular participation in both seminar and tutorial is necessary.

The seminar provides insight into different forms of interviews (problem-centred, expert, narrative interview, focus group interview), deductive and inductive proceedings in qualitative research, content analysis, work with MaxQda, etc. It aims at a perspective of a researcher and questions occurring within the research project (Taking one interview, doing participant observation).

Part of the seminar aims at presentation of students' own research ideas for their project.

The tutorial aims at deepening the seminar and assisting students in designing their research project.

Aim of the seminar is that students may be prepared for writing an empirical master thesis based on own interviews.

10 credits will be achieved for regular participation, reading of research methodological literature, design and application of your own research project (one interview, transcript, coding and analysis) presenting the results in a research report (appr. 20 pages). The tutors and I will help you in designing your research. The seminar requires much labor input.

Knowledge of qualitative methods is helpful but not necessary.

Module 6 Regional and Global Order

The classes aim to be as interactive and based on student participation as possible. For each session, obligatory readings will be the basis for an introductory presentation by the instructor

and discussions in class. The additional readings offer further starting points for your term papers. Moreover, the course is oriented towards applied public policy and the training of analytical skills. The focus is accordingly less on theoretical approaches but rather practical capacities to analyse “real life” policy problems and draft applied analyses.

The course builds step-by-step up to drafting your term paper. During course of the seminar, three assignments of max. three pages are to be handed in (deadlines see detailed syllabus) for all those students who aim to achieve the max credit points connected to finalising a module. The class will be

subdivided into three groups, each group will be presenting and commenting a short policy brief in one of the class presentation sessions. Students who aim to only get credit points for “participation” will have to deliver only the policy brief for the session they will present in. The main purpose of the assignments is to offer a basic skills training on how to draft policy briefs and term papers.

Course requirements for min. credit points for participation in MA Sowi or PACS, 4 CP:

- preparation and participation in class
- delivery of one policy brief (on policy evaluation, formulation or implementation)
- presentation of the respective policy brief in class
- comments of policy brief of a peer in other session

Content: Aim and Structure of the Course

The course offers an introduction to policy processes exemplified by policy-making in the European Union (EU). The main questions the course deals with are: what is a policy process, how can we analyse it – and how can we shape a policy process?

The focus on the EU offers a somewhat special example of a political system. Famously characterised as ‘less than a federation, more than a regime’ (W. Wallace), the EU does not easily fit the traditional conceptions of state-centred governance. As a consequence, the EU is often accused of being too little transparent and its policy process incomprehensible for citizens. At the same time, the EU signs responsible for a substantial part of public policies in its 27 member states. Moreover, the EU is a dominant global player that has not only a forceful trade policy but is also the largest provider of development assistance worldwide. Taking a concrete look at policy processes, we will therefore ask: how is the EU structured, who decides what – and how can we evaluate EU policy-making?

Linking analytical and practical questions about the policy process with the study of the European Union, the course addresses students with an interest in the Union’s internal functioning and as global actor. Given the importance the EU has in today’s global governance understanding how the EU works is essential – not only for Europeans. At the end of the course you should be familiar with the main notions of public policy analysis and policy processes in general. In addition, you will have gained basic knowledge about the EU’s institutional framework and policy-making procedures so that you can pinpoint substantive supranational policy problems and develop recommendations of taking different roles in the policy process and public policy-making more generally.

Content: Das Seminar nimmt ausgewählte Konflikte des frühen und hohen Mittelalters (500-1250) in den Blick und fragt auf der Grundlage gemeinsamer Quellenlektüre (in deutscher Übersetzung) danach, welche Konflikte wie geschildert werden und welche Lösungsmöglichkeiten zu unterschiedlichen Zeiten und in unterschiedlichen Fällen existierten bzw. von den Autoren berichtet werden. Dadurch sollen Regelungsmechanismen dieser Zeit herausgearbeitet werden, um in vergleichender Perspektive aufzuzeigen ob und wie sie sich von späteren Epochen, insbesondere der Gegenwart unterscheiden.

For the participation in this seminar a registration via the e-mail "angelika.bergien@ovgu.de" is required.

Content: Unlike traditional linguistics, which tends to focus on the structures of language, the field of pragmatics explores language in the context of the speakers who use it and the culture(s) in which those speakers live. The aim of this course is to discuss and evaluate a range of issues dealing with the relationship between language and society. For more than three decades many pragmatic and sociolinguistic studies of interaction have considered politeness to be one central concept governing and underpinning interaction. Politeness' "evil twin" impoliteness has been largely neglected until very recently. This course will be devoted to the

study of politeness and impoliteness in different discourses. Students will thereby gain a greater appreciation of the cultural context of language usage.

Content: This seminar will focus on the controversial relationship between human rights and sustainability. The relationship between human rights and sustainability is not only theoretically contested, but also practically challenged in times of climate change and a changing international order. What does it mean to adopt a human rights perspective on sustainability? Is there a human right to development or to a clean environment? Through a discussion of scientific literature, interactive group work on empirical case studies dealing with current developments in human rights and sustainability politics and an excursion, we will critically examine central theoretical concepts, legal issues and institutions, actors and policies at the interface of human rights and sustainable development. The aim of the seminar is to (i) to get a thorough understanding of institutional structures and political processes in international sustainability and human rights governance, (ii) to analyse the role of civil and political rights as well as of economic, social and cultural rights in the global sustainable development architecture, and (iii) to be able to critically identify and examine current challenges at the intersection of human rights and sustainability.

Content: Rural regions promise great potentials for the realization of sustainable development. In the seminar different concepts of sustainable regional development and regional governance will be discussed. The gained knowledge will be deepened by concrete examples from practice, e.g. in Sachsen-Anhalt.

Content: Das Seminar beschäftigt sich politikwissenschaftlich mit wissenschaftlicher Politikberatung. Im Mittelpunkt stehen wichtige theoretische Konzepte und die Politikberatungslandschaft. Neben der Diskussion bestehender Modelle wissenschaftlicher Politikberatung sollen auch aktuelle hier relevante Diskussionen wie „Post-Faktismus“, „War on Science“, „transformative Wissenschaft“ kritisch beleuchtet werden. Konkret sollen dabei die Fälle Corona-Krise und Nachhaltigkeit betrachtet werden. Beide sind sehr aktuell und quasi „idealtypisch“ geeignet, das Verhältnis zwischen Wissenschaft und Politik zu untersuchen. Die Bereitschaft, sich durchgehend auf dem Stand der aktuellen politischen Debatten zu halten sowie englischsprachige Texte zu lesen ist für dieses Seminar unabdingbar. Geplant ist außerdem eine Exkursion in eine relevante Politikberatungsinstitution (je nach Pandemiesituation).

The seminar deals with scientific policy advice from a political science perspective. It focuses on important theoretical concepts and the advisory landscape. In addition to the discussion of existing models of scientific policy advice, current relevant discussions such as "Post-Factism", "War on Science", "transformative science" will be critically examined. Specifically, the cases of corona crisis and sustainability will be considered. Both are very topical and quasi "ideal-typically" suited to examine the relationship between science and politics. The willingness to keep up to date with current political debates and to read English texts is indispensable for this seminar. An excursion to a relevant policy advisory institution is also planned (depending on the pandemic situation)

Bildung für Nachhaltige Entwicklung – Gegenstand politischer Auseinandersetzungen

Note: Voraussetzung: Interesse an der Erstellung eines Podcasts und an interdisziplinärer Zusammenarbeit.

Content: Das Seminar möchte Bildung für Nachhaltige Entwicklung (BNE) aus interdisziplinärer Perspektive betrachten und dabei bildungswissenschaftliche sowie politikwissenschaftliche Erkenntnisse und Denkweise verknüpfen. Was ist unter Bildung für Nachhaltige Entwicklung zu verstehen und was sind ihre Ursprünge? Was sind didaktische Prämissen und Ansätze der BNE? Was sind mögliche (politische) Faktoren, die unterschiedliche Ausprägen von BNE im internationalen Vergleich erklären können? Diese Fragen und weitere Fragen aus den Bereichen der Bildungswissenschaft (Teil I), der Internationalen Beziehungen (Teil II) und der Policy Analyse (Teil III) sollen im Seminar erkundet werden, indem der Weg von der internationalen politischen Ebene bis zum Curriculum systematisch nachvollzogen wird.

Zu diesem Zweck setzt das Seminar auf eine didaktische Ausgestaltung, die Studierende noch stärker als gewohnt ins Zentrum stellt: Interaktive Vorlesungen durch Referent*innen aus verschiedenen Disziplinen sowie aus der Praxis dienen dazu, gemeinsam mit den Studierenden, Theorie und reale Herausforderungen der BNE gegenüber zu stellen und miteinander zu verbinden. Studierende erhalten die Möglichkeit, im Rahmen einer Gruppenarbeit ihr Wissen auf ein selbst gewähltes BNE-Projekt anzuwenden und dieses Projekt als Podcast zu erarbeiten. Der Kurs soll Studierende mit dem notwendigen Wissen und Fähigkeiten ausstatten, um sich kritisch und interdisziplinär mit Bildung für Nachhaltige Entwicklung als Gegenstand politischer Bildung und politischer Debatte auseinanderzusetzen.

Content: Reporting on issues related to international conflict, military affairs and conflict resolution constitutes a particularly challenging task for journalists. The seminar aims to provide both practical and theoretical insights into this increasingly important field. Students will be pointed to specific techniques and sources to be used in the field of conflict reporting as well as to relevant conceptual debates on contemporary journalism and armed conflict. In addition, it will be discussed how journalists can cope with professional and ethical dilemmas they are facing when dealing with relevant political, military or paramilitary actors. The course will include a study trip to Berlin where participants are to meet with governments officials, members of parliament, NGO activists and journalists specialized in reporting on international conflict, wars and foreign affairs.

Note: Aufarbeitung der belasteten Vergangenheit der SED-Diktatur in Deutschland als Modell für den Umgang mit politischem Unrecht.

Content: Die Lehrveranstaltung orientiert sich an zentralen Themen der Aufarbeitung politischen Unrechts in der SBZ/ DDR. Sie hat zum Ziel, die Bereiche politischer Repression in der SBZ/ DDR bis 1989 kennenzulernen über die Aufarbeitung seit 1989 zu informieren sowie die Rehabilitierung und Entschädigung der Diktaturoper zu thematisieren.
In den einzelnen Themenbereichen sollen auch Kontroversen innerhalb der ostdeutschen Gesellschaft abgebildet werden.
Weitere Fragestellungen: Welche Methoden werden zur Aufarbeitung eingesetzt/ wurden neu entwickelt? Was sind Ziele der Aufarbeitung? Wie ist die soziale und gesundheitliche Lage der Opfer? Wie ist die Rolle der früheren Systemträger in der Gesellschaft? In welchem Verhältnis stehen Sie zueinander?
Wie verhalten sich juristische Aufarbeitung, Lustration, historische Aufarbeitung, Gerechtigkeit und Versöhnung zueinander? Wie ist der Stand der Aufarbeitung einzuschätzen? Gibt es besser geeignete Wege zu einer Versöhnung in Ostdeutschland?
Im internationalen Vergleich: Wie ist der Prozess nach der Diktatur in anderen Ländern verlaufen? (Postkommunistisch/ Postfaschistisch). Was lässt sich daraus für Demokratiebewegungen z.B. in Belarus (Post-post-kommunistisch) oder Hongkong (von Demokratie zu kommunistischer Einparteiherrschaft) lernen?

Content: The seminar introduces students to the feminist perspectives in International Relations. A particular focus will be placed on intersectional feminist theory and critical approaches to security, war, and militarism. The aim of the seminar is to get a better understanding of the role played by gender in armed conflict and to investigate how binary constructions intersects with other systems of power such as race, colonialism and capitalism.

4 CP: Presentation of postcolonial novel and forum discussions.

6 CP: Term paper (4,000 to 5,000 words).

Content: Travel writing constitutes a hybrid genre that engages with the representation of real or imagined geographies. Because travel entails a movement away from a familiar place to an unfamiliar one, it also relates to the difference between the self and the other. Therefore, travel writing has become a central topic in Postcolonial Studies dealing with ideas of centre and margin, identity, border crossings, hybridity, diaspora, gender, transculturation, etc. This seminar assesses the hegemonic functions of travel-writing but also its potential for resistance in a historical perspective. After a comprehensive introduction to the genre, the first half of the course engages with fictional and non-fictional travel accounts from various regions of the British Empire. We will consider different forms of colonial travel writing, such as the Robinsonade, explorer's journals, imperial romances, ethnographic reports, or women's letters, in order to identify the central poetics and politics of colonial travel literature. Parallel to that, students will research a postcolonial text of their choice. In a project phase during the second half of the course, we will come together in different forums discussing travel writing with view to generic adaptations, intertextual references, paradigmatic topics, and aspects of transculturality.

Note: The course is primarily meant for 2nd term students in obligatoty module 4 and worth 10 credit points.
Students from higher semesters can also parttake as a course in module 9.

Content: Often, postcoloniality is presented as something far away from Europe. In seminars on post-colonial theory we teach literature from people everywhere in the world and talk about how things should be different on a grand scale. However, postcoloniality as a condition concerns the whole world and is as relevant today and in Magdeburg as it is anywhere else. The seminar aims at identifying ways in which the postcolonial condition is present in Magdeburg through neo-colonial attitudes, racist custom and ignorance. It will try to pinpoint local issues that stand in a context of colonial history and propose plans of action to address those issues.

The course is planned as a research seminar. Over the first weeks we will have 4-hour sessions where we will work on both de- and postcolonial theory and methodology. The rest of the seminar will then have a workshop format: you will carry out small research projects in groups

in the weeks with no sessions and give each other feedback and discuss preliminary results when we have sessions.

The final outcome will vary according to the amount of credit points you need.

Modul 9: for 4 CP the outcomes have to be presented in the final session in a poster format. For 6 CP, additionally to the poster presentation a group term paper has to be written that details the research process and outcomes.

The course leaves a lot of room for you to do your own project and follow up on what you are interested in. That means also, that you need to be willing to work autonomously and collaborate well with your group.

Content: This seminar will focus on the controversial relationship between human rights and sustainability. The relationship between human rights and sustainability is not only theoretically contested, but also practically challenged in times of climate change and a changing international order. What does it mean to adopt a human rights perspective on sustainability? Is there a human right to development or to a clean environment? Through a discussion of scientific literature, interactive group work on empirical case studies dealing with current developments in human rights and sustainability politics and an excursion, we will critically examine central theoretical concepts, legal issues and institutions, actors and policies at the interface of human rights and sustainable development. The aim of the seminar is to (i) to get a thorough understanding of institutional structures and political processes in international sustainability and human rights governance, (ii) to analyse the role of civil and political rights as well as of economic, social and cultural rights in the global sustainable development architecture, and (iii) to be able to critically identify and examine current challenges at the intersection of human rights and sustainability.

- Content:** Im Anschluss an die Veröffentlichung von John Rawls` Hauptwerk *Eine Theorie der Gerechtigkeit* (1971) hat sich in der Philosophie eine Diskussion über Verteilungsgerechtigkeit entwickelt, die unter dem Namen "Egalitarismus-Debatte" bekannt geworden ist. Im Mittelpunkt dieser Diskussion, die bis heute anhält, stehen zwei Fragen: (i) Ist die gleiche Verteilung bestimmter Güter moralisch intrinsisch wertvoll und ihre Herbeiführung daher moralisch geboten, oder kommt es auf Gleichverteilung gar nicht an?
